The list also includes recipients of the Legion of Merit, Distinguished Flying Cross, Soldier's Medal, Navy & Marine Corps Medal, Silver Star, Air Medal, Commendation Medal and Bronze Star. There is also a listing of players who received a battlefield commission. The list is in no way complete, so if you can add names and details I would be very grateful.

Stan Ferek

What might have been if Hitler and Tojo hadn't gotten ideas.

Stanley W. Ferek, Jr., was born in Keisterville, Pennsylvania, about 40 miles south of Pittsburgh on December 5, 1921. His father, Stanley, was a coal miner with the Lincoln Coal and Coke Company, and had arrived in the United States from Poland in 1908.

Young Stanley, a left-handed pitcher and first baseman who batted from both sides of the plate, played at Uniontown High School and on the sandlots of Fayette County where he made quite a name for himself with Keister in the Dice-Spalding League. In 1941, he won 27 games without a loss, and had talks during the summer with Del Baker, manager of the Detroit Tigers, but was signed by the Pittsburgh Pirates in September. After working during the winter at



the Youngstown Sheet and Tube Company in Nemaocolin, Pennsylvania, Stan reported to the Oil City Oilers, of the Class D Penn State Association in the spring of 1942. He quickly established himself as part of the Oilers' starting rotation and made 27 appearances for an 8-7 record and 4.03 ERA, pitching more innings per appearance than any other hurler on the squad. He also batted .242 in 42 games. His last appearance for the Oilers saw him beat the Washington Redbirds, 9-3. The following day he enlisted in the Marine Corps at the Connellsville recruiting station and attended boot camp at Parris Island, South Carolina.




By 1944, Stan was in Hawaii and stationed at Camp Catlin, west of Honolulu. The Camp Catlin Gators were entered in the 10-team West Division of the Honolulu League, which played from January to April 1944. Although overshadowed by powerhouse teams like the 7th Air Force, Pearl Harbor Marines, Aiea Naval Barracks and Fort Shafter, Stan made a name for himself when he hurled a no-hitter against the Coast Guard Cutters on February 25. Unfortunately, confusion with his last name being similar to that of Tom Ferrick, the Cleveland Indians pitcher who had just arrived in Hawaii, resulted in the latter being credited with the no-hitter in the local press and the Williams Equipment Player of the Week award being given to Ferrick, instead of Stan. Nevertheless, word of his military baseball success was reaching the home front. "He'll be a great help to us when he comes back," Leo Mackey, Pirates scout told the *Uniontown Morning Herald*.



At the beginning of the summer of 1944, Stan pitched for the Catlin Marines Raiders in the 14th Naval District League, but pretty soon he was on his way to the battle-torn islands of the Pacific campaign. Private First-Class Ferek took part in the invasions of the Marshall Islands, Saipan (where he suffered wounds to his knee and fingers), Tinian and Iwo Jima, ending up in Japan after the surrender.

Aged 24, the bespectacled chucker, who played trumpet in an orchestra during the off-season, was with the Albany Senators of the Class A Eastern League and the Selma Cloverleafs of the Class B Southeastern League in 1946, posting a 1-4 record with the Senators and 3-2 record with the Cloverleafs. Stan made the jump to Triple-A ball in 1947, joining the Indianapolis Indians of the American Association. In 28 appearances for the Indians, he was 4-5 with a 4.26 ERA and was purchased by the Pirates at the

end of the season. Stan pitched for the Pirates throughout spring training in 1948, and manager Bill Meyer said, "Of the rookies, Stan Ferek and Dick Piatnek have looked very good and they've got a chance." But it was not to be for either pitcher, Stan was returned to Indianapolis for the start of the season where he made six appearances for an 0-2 record before being released to the New Orleans Pelicans of the Class AA Southern Association, where he made a further five appearances for a 3-2 record.



Stan's final season in organized baseball was with the Albany Senators in 1949. He made 14 appearances for a 1-2 record before retiring. "We were sure when we first met Ferek shortly after the conclusion of World War II that he would succeed in reaching the majors," opined Ralph Schulze, sports editor of the *Uniontown Evening Standard*. "Stan's stint in the Marine Corps may have cut short his career. We will never know...nevertheless we like to think that he would have been up there making the headlines if Hitler and Tojo hadn't gotten ideas."

For a few years, he played for Paulchek's in the County League and Nemaocolin in the Big Ten, scouted for the Pirates throughout western Pennsylvania, along with parts of West Virginia, Maryland and Ohio, and operated Ferek's Atlantic Service Station in Carmichaels, Pennsylvania. He also led a locally renowned polka band and was inducted in the Big Ten-Fayette County Sandlot Baseball Hall of Fame in 1971. Stan Ferek was just 56 years old when he passed away on December 30, 1977, in Carmichaels, Pennsylvania. He is buried at Greene County Memorial Park in Morgan Township, Pennsylvania.


